What inspired you to write this book? Why did you write it?

I am completely inspired to do my part as I have been called by God to do. This book is a culmination of my experience as a songwriter called to write songs specifically about Him. That is exactly my lighting rod experience in April of 1995. After this most inspiring moment of my life, I had my marching orders. I create the record label Solid Walnut Music and we made five albums and distributed them to radio stations in 15 countries. Because of this experience and because of my subsequent experiences with online songwriting organizations I became very well versed in song legal and helping songwriters understand this part of it.

As I began this journey and participated in worship teams and led worship teams and attended worship leader conferences, I saw and lived through the rise of the popularity of worship music as it became a thing in the music industry. I loved participating with popular worship music. I have embraced, learned, and played many songs.

But there was also something I saw on this rise that gave me pause: there are many songwriters out there, and I'll include myself, on the outside looking into the music industry. And we want to contribute. But there are many gates for people who like to write songs about God that make it so we can't contribute. We must compete with Nashville just to get our songs heard, for just one thing. There's that angle, which I go into much depth about in *The 5 Steps to Get Your Songs Heard*. Then there is the gate of just getting your songs heard in your local church. Close to impossible unless you're the worship leader introducing songs. Even then, that's hard for them to do (I have). It's a great way to see if what you write sticks with people, but it's not a great way to get a worship leader's songs heard. There are many steps beyond just playing them in your church for you to generate interest in them past that experience, unless you are the worship leader of a large church.

Worship leaders are busy people, you know?? They have the task of leading others to the throne during 20 minutes, mentoring their team, and creating a culture of worship in their church. A part of the song description isn't to try and get there songs out there.

Anyway, so my experience is seeing songwriters frustrated to get their songs heard, including my own. And I feel very strongly that God hasn't called only me to get my songs out there. My call to write songs about him, my lightning rod moment of April '95, wasn't just a call to ME. It was a call to ALL songwriters that have had similar moments. A part of my call is to pave the way for songwriters to get their songs heard, and the vehicle I am providing is what I call the small-church songwriting revolution. This is turning into The Songs4God.net Songwriting Academy, which begins with *The 5 Steps to Get Your Songs Heard: A Congregational Songwriting Plan*.

2. What is the small-church songwriting revolution and the Songs4God.net Songwriting Academy?

The small-church songwriting revolution is the rise of the individual songwriter called by God who goes to a small- or medium-sized church. The plan provides a way for these songwriters to get their songs heard in their church or local community. It's called the small-church songwriting revolution because for

the past twenty years, we've only heard songs from large church songwriting communities. Those are the ones that have become popular and the ones everyone wants to use in their churches, but there is a strong need for songs born from the grass roots. Our churches need songs that reflect how God is moving in our communities. Specific songs for specific communities. So, nothing wrong with these large-church songs we have, but we have been excluding the songwriters in our communities and this plan is a way to stop that.

What is the Songs4God.net Songwriting Academy? It is the how the blueprint presented in *The 5 Steps to Get Your Songs Heard* comes to life. It is an online songwriting course designed to prepare songwriters and people who love songwriting administration to get their songs heard in the small-church revolution. Stay tuned for more information.

3. What did you learn when writing the book?

I learned that I could create a plan from a disparate group of thoughts. I have written a lot of material on this subject. The first drafts of this book are 3 times the length of the final version. Many of the ideas have spawned other books and other materials that will be used in the songwriting academy. What I learned during the process was that I needed to write a book that had BOTH the overall concept and a complete plan. But both needed to be presented so the concept made sense and was simple to grasp. Hence the five-step theme.

It was important to me to write this book in a way that grabbed the reader rather than to just spew out all that was in my mind. I need to engage the reader and to encourage them to join the small-church songwriting revolution and to take these principles and make them their own. Start their own songwriting communities.
